PROPERTY INFO

Family-owned for 7 generations, since 1810, the **Brauereigasthof Hotel Aying** cultivates personal and warm hospitality. The Inselkammer family combines traditional with the modern Bavarian flair and extra comfort.

The Bavarian town of Aying is 15 miles southeast of Munich, easily accessible by public transport on the S-Bahn from Munich Main Train Station and the airport.

HOTEL'S HISTORY

- 1385: The inn is documented for the very first time.
- 1810: Franz and Katharina Liebhard acquire the estate »Zum Pfleger«, the Liebhards being the ancestors of the current owners, the Inselkammer family.
- 1878: Founding of the Ayinger Brewery. Johann Liebhard turns the tavern into a brewery and guest house.



HOTEL AMENITIES

- 48 individually furbished rooms,
 4 Star-Superior-Category, from cosy single-rooms to spacious junior suites
- 2 à la carte restaurants: fine-dining at its best in the main buildinginspired by ingredients from the surrounding farms or our own hunting-ground. Across the street: Ayinger Bräustüberl, a traditional Bavarian tavern and inn. This is the place where locals, excursionists and tourists meet.

DID YOU KNOW THAT ...

 in front of the hotel you'll find one of the highest maypoles in Bavaria? It's built every five years by the local bachelors' club, the Ayinger Burschenverein, in the traditional manner of using long wooden poles known as Scherenstangen.



- Ayinger Brewery is one of the highest-rated breweries in the world and also part of the family business. Join a guided brewery-tour during your stay!
- The **Troadkasten** (snug granary) and the historic Skittle Alley (old-time bowling alley) are unique event-rooms for guests.
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Listed as a historic building, each room in the **Manor House** is named after family members who lived at this property over seven generations.



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
